The Consumer Price Index put food inflation at 30.64% on a year-on-year basis, which was 7.30% points higher, compared to the rate recorded in September 2022.

Food Security and Human Rights


Eating is a fundamental human right, recognized by the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. When food security is compromised, human rights violations can occur.








About Agtrade
